## WORSHIP & MUSIC NEWS for OCTOBER

The Worship & Music Committee continues to supervise the planning of Salem's worship services during this interim period without a full-time pastor in residence. Our current worship schedule of ELW Setting 3 on the first Sunday of the month, With One Voice Setting 5 on the second Sunday of the month, Chicago Folk Service on the third Sunday of the month, and ELW Setting 3 on the fourth and fifth Sundays of the month, will continue through October.

Pastor Bonnie Sparks has been hired as our Regular Supply Pastor and she will be leading our worship services every Sunday, except for emergencies and vacation, through April 24, 2011. Pastor Bonnie has requested, and the Worship & Music Committee has agreed, that communion be served every Sunday that she is present to lead the worship service. When she is not here, Pastor Bonnie suggested that we use the Service of the Word, a non-communion worship service, which our Lay Assistants have most capably led several times earlier this year. The Service of the Word, as adapted from the LBW hymnal by Rosemary Rader, has been very well received by worshippers who have attended this service.

Since our former organist, George Karst, departed for a new position, and a reception was held in his honor on September 5, Rosemary Rader has filled in superbly as organist and choir director. Rhunell Gruender, who resigned the organist position in 2008 after 11 years of outstanding musical performance at Salem, will be returning as organist beginning Sunday, October 3.

The Worship & Music Committee is seeking additional volunteers to serve as greeters, ushers, acolytes, lectors, and especially, lay assistants for our worship services. Additional volunteers for these positions would ease the burden on our current volunteers of having to serve so often. We are also seeking additional volunteers, including men, to serve on the Altar Guild. The task of preparing communion each week deserves to be spread over a greater number of people than the three ladies currently volunteering their time. If, after prayerful consideration, you are interested in any of these positions, please contact the church office or the Worship & Music Committee.

We hope you will enjoy the worship services and music planned by the Worship & Music Committee. Current Worship & Music Committee members include Bel Hedlund, Laura Morgan, Rosemary Rader, Julie and Sean Rice, Diann Ryan, and Pastor Bonnie Sparks. If you have questions or concerns about the worship services, please let us know. Our sole mission is that you come to worship with us again and again to hear God's word and sing His praises. May God bless us as we seek His will for our lives and for our congregation.

*(The following meditation was presented at sermon time during the Sunday morning worship service on August 15, 2010)*

### ***Meditation for Sunday August 15, 2010***

When I volunteered to give a "meditation" for today in place of a sermon from a trained, qualified and ordained pastor, I thought I might just be reading a 3-5 minute sermonette provided by someone else. "Great! I can read", I thought, "good enough--Easy. I'll be in town on the 15<sup>th</sup> of August, so I'll take that date."

Only after I had committed to this Sunday did I realize, "Oh, **I'm** supposed to think and pray about the Gospel lesson and try to offer something of my own." Last month Rosemary gave a lovely reflection on Mary and Martha, setting the bar pretty high. "Well," I thought, "I used to give little children's sermons at my former church, perhaps the lesson will be one of my old favorites." Then I read the Gospel for today.

"I came to bring fire to the earth and how I wish it were already kindled . . . Do you think I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you but rather division!"

**What?** Oh, no, I've always had trouble understanding this Jesus. Fire, Division . . . 2 against 3, 3 against 2 . . . Conflict!

Where's the "Prince of Peace?" Where's the healer, making the sick well, healing the slave's ear in the garden and telling Peter when he pulls out his sword "No more of this!" How do I reconcile the man telling the parable of the good Samaritan and saying pray for your enemies, with a man who will divide households and kindle a fire. Jesus, the destroyer? The Jesus who turns the other cheek will be causing a schism in families turning father against son and mother-in-law against daughter-in-law? What? This is NOT easy. I want the Easy button. Modern life in America is all about EASY.

Perhaps that is exactly why I ended up having to reflect on this gospel, so that God could help me try to understand difficult things. Part of what I think Jesus is trying to tell his disciples, to tell me, to tell all of us, is that really following him is NOT going to be easy. Being a Christian is no guarantee of earthly bliss. We will have to make difficult decisions and act in ways that challenge us and challenge the status quo. That will be hard.

Think about when Jesus lived on this earth and the Jewish religion with all the traditions so strong. Jesus and his followers were shaking up society. The Pharisees, the old guard were threatened. No wonder they wanted to get rid of Jesus, he wanted to destroy their complacent way of life. We Lutherans can certainly understand some of that. Lutherans love the comfort of tradition and ritual. Remember those changing the light bulb jokes. How many Lutherans does it take to change a light bulb? Change?! We love the familiar. There is great ease in doing things the same way. I've always thought that as much as I love being a citizen of the United States, I would never have had the revolutionary zeal to break away from England. Fight a war with the "mother country"? I know I would have been saying, "No, we can't go against the King. We can't have a government that's different. We could lose our homes, our farms, our lives." I'd like to think of myself as bravely following a cause but I know myself too well. I know when I confess, I am mostly guilty of "things left undone."

One of my friends used to say in reference to making a change in your life, whether it's exercising, eating well or even getting out of a bad relationship, that you will change when the pain of staying the same is greater than the pain of changing. Change is painful. Change requires getting rid of old habits and ways of thought and making room for new. That's painful. That requires effort. Sometimes the old and comfortable must be destroyed to make room for the new. Just as a forest fire consumes the old dead wood and allows new growth, we might have to destroy old habits.

So back to the gospel--Jesus knows that what he is saying is revolutionary. That to truly make your relationship with God #1 in your life, it will take effort. Something will be required of you. Look at his disciples. They quit their jobs as fisherman. Matthew gave up his lucrative tax collecting business. And eventually their very lives were required of them. Even the very human part of Jesus doesn't want to make the hard choice as he prays in the garden "Father if you are willing remove this cup from me; YET not my will but thine be done." Jesus was in a human body. He didn't want to endure painful suffering and death. No human being does. But Jesus chose the hard way because it was the right way. It was God's way, God's will.

Jesus did not come to this earth to bring peace. Today's gospel compels me to acknowledge that God's peace is not peace at any price. It's not the calmness of routine or the comfort of the familiar. I have to confront the fact

that, in this world, to follow God's will we will have to make decisions that are hard. As Christians we are not promised a comfortable life. Our temporal hopes are replaced by eternal hope. Our lives will have trouble but God is with us. God is our refuge and our strength. His peace is the knowledge that whatever befalls us in our earthly life, our relationship with God must be the driving force in all our decisions and actions. To truly follow Jesus is hard. To truly follow Jesus is to grow and change. To truly follow Jesus—it will be hard; it will be life-changing. What it won't be is EASY.

Over 500 people, including Indiana-Kentucky Synod pastors, lay leaders and congregational members, ecumenical and interfaith guests, friends and family worshiped together at the joyous installation festival liturgy as ELCA Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson installed the Rev. William O. Gafkjen as the new bishop Saturday, September 11 at St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Indianapolis.

Bishop Mark Hanson, regional bishops and other judicatory leaders joined in the laying on of hands on the head of Bishop Gafkjen as they prayed that the Holy Spirit empower and enlighten his ministry. In his energizing sermon, Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson implored all who gathered together to "Go! Go out and proclaim!"

Among the people gathered to worship was a 100-member choir composed of the Valparaiso University Chapel Kantorei and members from synod congregations. A percussionist and instrumental and vocal ensembles celebrated the world's cultural diversity with music from Chile, Indonesia, Central America, as well as Native American music.

Bishop Gafkjen wore a chasuble (like a poncho) and stole created by former synod vice president Judy Rehmel. The chalice used at the altar was commissioned and given by Mitch and Charisse Phillips.

## **Bishop Gafkjen lists among his priorities as bishop:**

"Overall, my concern is that the ELCA Lutherans in Indiana and Kentucky grow deeply as people who live with open hearts and open hands, freely receiving and sharing the abundant grace and goodness of God. A number of challenges present themselves to us and are on the minds of our congregations and their leaders:

- (1) We need to rediscover the deep unity in Christ that enables us to live and work together across profound differences of perspective on important issues;
- (2) Like nearly every not-for-profit organization that I know of, our congregations are struggling financially and, consequently, so are the ministries beyond and between congregations that are dependent on funding from these congregations;
- (3) Most of our congregations are still trying to figure out how to most faithfully be the body of Christ in a rapidly-changing and confusing context.

A first order priority for me is to draw us deeply into the reality of Christ crucified and risen for the life of the world as we discover new, creative and effective ways to empower, equip and encourage the leaders and congregations of the ELCA who live and work in Indiana and Kentucky, and to address these challenges and move energetically and effectively into the world to share the many and varied gifts God has given them for the world around them."

## About Your Synod: Freed to Lead Success Stories

The Freed to Lead Grant Board recently approved another eight awards to pastors of the I-K Synod. *Awards now total \$504,706 in grants to 16 pastors.*

In addition to the original Lilly Endowment seed grant of \$570,000, gifts and pledges from individuals, churches, and other organizations total \$347,823. Included in that amount is \$33,980 in honor of Bishop James Stuck.

Annual reports from pastors who received grants a year ago have been received with the following comments being typical: "The grant has had a huge impact on my personal life, my marriage and my stress level. My wife and I attended Dave Ramsey's Peace University at our church and that coupled with the grant we have learned how to handle money. ## ELCA News - ELCA Presiding Bishop's Third Town Hall Forum

CHICAGO (ELCA) -- Presiding ELCA Bishop Mark Hanson responded to a variety of questions in a live online "Town Hall Forum" Sept. 19, including topics such as evangelism, relationships with Muslims, human sexuality, signs of hope, mission funding, church unity, Middle East concerns and full communion relationships.

The first question came from an online participant who asked the presiding bishop for suggestions on what Lutherans might do to take "more evangelical action" within their congregations and community.

Hanson said that the question points to "exactly the orientation that we have taken as a churchwide organization for the future of the ELCA. We have placed directors of evangelical mission on every synod staff. It is our vision that every congregation is growing as an evangelical center for mission."

"We have a tendency to be a bit reserved as Lutherans about naming the name of Jesus," he said. "Together as the ELCA, one of our themes is that we are called during our Baptism to be everyday evangelists in Word and deed, testifying through the good news of God's love in Christ for the whole creation. But that doesn't come naturally to us. We have to be bold."
